CHIEF'S March 2016
REPORT TO THE BOARD
Presented April 21st, 2016



During the month of March 2016, the Midland Police responded to 720 calls for service. This is up from 536 incidents during the same time period in 2015. Incident reports generated to date for 2016 stand at 1928 as compared to 1688 for 2015.

Calls for service **DO NOT** include:

- Traffic Stops, *Highway Traffic Act* charges or warnings issued
- RIDE Spot-check hours or vehicles stopped in RIDE
- Community Service events, meetings, school visits, drop in visits, or lectures
- Foot Patrol in high visibility areas
- Pedestrian interactions
- Parking tickets issued
- **Some** miscellaneous provincial statute charges

CRIMINAL OFFENCES – March 2016

Theft Under \$5,000

(10) Thefts reported. (2) were cleared through investigation or charge, and (1) was cleared by discretion/diversion. The balance are under investigation. Clearance rate (30%)

Mischief

(12) Mischief occurrences. (2) were cleared by investigation or charge and (1) was cleared by discretion/diversion. The balance are under investigation. Clearance rate (25%)

Break and Enter

(7) break and enters. (1) was cleared by investigation or charge. The remaining matters are under investigation by the Service. Clearance rate (14%)

Fraud

(9) frauds were reported. (2) were cleared by investigation or charge and (1) was cleared by discretion/diversion. The balance are under investigation. Clearance rate (33%)

Assault

There were (6) assaults reported to the Service in the month of March. (3) were cleared through investigation or charge and the balance are under investigation. Clearance rate (50%)

Sexual Assault

There were (2) sexual assaults reported to the service in March. Both were cleared by investigation or charge. Clearance rate, 100%.

Criminal Harassment/Threats

(5) harassment complaints. (3) were cleared through investigation or charge and (1) was cleared by discretion/diversion. Clearance rate (80%)

(4) threatening cases were reported to the Midland Police Service during the month of March. The Service cleared (3) through investigation or charge and the remaining matter is under investigation. Clearance rate (75%)

There were (8) criminal matters referred to discretion/diversion/alternative measures.

There were (4) referrals to the Victim Crisis and Referral Service.

RIDE: Midland officers conducted a total of (63) hours of RIDE, stopping (1757) vehicles in the process. A total of (10) traffic cautions were issued. No impaired drivers were detected.

Foot Patrol: (103) hours of foot patrol was conducted in our high visibility locations, including the downtown area, Rotary Trail, NSSRC and others.

Auxiliary Hours: (143.5) hours of service which included; general patrol with uniformed officers and foot patrol.
